MABL World Series Play Begins As MSBL Pool Play Wraps Up By Tom Prendergast

Round two of the MSBL World Series begins today as the jockeying for a seeding position ends and the 28+ / 38+ playoffs start. Eight 28+ American teams and six 28+ National teams will battle it out for a chance to make it to the championship game on Friday. In the 38+ American division, all four teams will get a chance to advance in the semi-finals this afternoon, and six 38+ National division teams will challenge each other for the title of the best of the best.

Fifty MABL teams began play yesterday with the goal of being the last team standing in their divisions. Two of the top teams in the 18+ National division got off to an exciting start as the Long Island Storm came from behind to beat the Kansas City Titans 4-3. Four protests were lodged on a somewhat mildly controversial day as emotions ran high right from the first pitch.

Games continue nearly non-stop until the MABL playoffs start this weekend.

Scoring "By the Book" in Rivercats' 39-1 Victory over Austin Legends

Truth be told, it was going to be a lopsided score anyway.

It was the 7th inning of the Sacramento Rivercats game against the Austin Legends yesterday in the 38+ National / American division at Tempe Diablo field three and the Rivercats were already up by a 19-1 margin. It was also the last day of pool play before the playoffs, and due to the quirks of this year's WS divisional brackets, both teams were already assured of their playoff positions.

So Legends manager Keith Johnson assessed the situation and came to the conclusion that his team would be better off with a loss and two innings worth of rest than attempting a comeback. He talked it over between innings with the Rivercats' manager and the umpires, and they all decided to end the game there.

That decision didn't come without a cost, however. According to league rules, if a team that is losing "quits" after 5 innings/2 hours, but before 9 innings/3 hours, that team is charged an extra 10 runs for each unplayed inning. Therefore, after applying the rules to this situation, an extra 20 runs were charged to the Legends (10 runs each for two unplayed innings), making the final score 39-1 Rivercats.



Diary of an Aging Baseball Player

Phoenix Forecast—Sunny and 80 (IV) Skies Partly Cloudy with Baseballs

Most clear thinking individuals would never consider Columbia, Missouri to be in the south. But after spending my formative baseball days in Illinois and Minnesota, believe me, Missouri is "south." But I didn't choose Missouri for the weather. I chose it for its journalism school. During that previous year in the real frozen Tundra, Minneapolis, I decided I wanted to be a college baseball coach. I needed a Master's degree to become one, so I applied to Missouri, thinking journalism would be an easy program to earn an advanced degree. That alone, may explain why I never made it as a reporter. Journalism? Easy? As one newspaper executive recently stated, "It's not rocket science. It's much more difficult than that."

So, on the recommendation of legendary Minnesota Coach Dick Siebert, I became an unpaid graduate assistant at the University of Missouri under the equally legendary John "Hi" Simmons. Coach Simmons became a legend because of his 34 seasons of coaching, his 700-plus wins and his creative use of the language.

"We've got more trouble than Carter's got oats."

"You guys are abhorrible."

"We didn't bring the circus to town, but we sure put up the tent."

I'm sure John "Hi" must have said some very quotable things about the weather, but I went there to be a baseball coach, not a journalist. In three short seasons I had moved from the over-32 degrees rule, to the "You'll Work Outside When I Tell You to Rule" to John Hi's over-40 degrees rule.

I never new 40 degrees could feel so warm.

The players we recruited from up north shared my enthusiasm for over-40. The Arizonans and Texans put 40-degree baseball on a level of pain between a foul ball off the instep and a Barry Manilow Concert.

On cold game days the facilities staff actually brought kerosene heaters into the dugout. Unlike football, where gathering around the sideline heaters immediately categorized you as a wimp, baseball players showed no shame in pushing and shoving to get to the closest space.

But not me. Even when the temperature was clinging to 40, I felt warm. I had learned the craft of staying warm in Illinois. I had polished that craft in Minnesota. At Missouri in 1972 we also had a secret weapon—wool uniforms. For those of you who have not had the pleasure (or the itch) of wearing wool, let me tell you this. It's hard to play baseball when you're using both hands to scratch yourself. If Washington's soldiers had been wearing wool uniforms at Valley Forge we might all be speaking like Austin Powers today.

We also wore long underwear underneath the uniforms. But I think that served more to protect us from the wool than the cold.

As a member of the Big Eight, Missouri had enough of a budget to head south for spring break. There we left the chill of Columbia for the stench of New Orleans. The Mississippi River, heat and humidity induced stench—that's about all I remember about New Orleans. We stayed in the French Quarter, right down there close to the action. I wandered out of the hotel late one night and wandered in to a nearby adult beverage parlor. As I entered the establishment I saw the middle of the room filled with a giant-sized brandy snifter. Three scantily-clad attendants were giving one of the customers a champagne sponge bath. The customer was one of our relief pitchers. I muttered the famous line Jack Buck would later steal from me, "I don't believe what I just saw." I promptly returned to the hotel.

We also looked forward to the Oklahoma or Oklahoma State road trips. Warm weather. Now those schools were really "south." I remember asking an Oklahoma assistant coach to show me their indoor workout facility. He laughed at me. "We don't have one. What I mean is, we don't need one." Now that's "south."

Now we also had to make road trips to Lincoln, Nebraska; Ames, Iowa; and Manhattan, Kansas. We always managed to get rain or snowed out on those trips. And the only thing worse than going to those towns and playing ball was going to those towns and not playing ball. Why couldn't we ever get held over in Boulder?
