Slugfest Continues As Offense Leads The Way In "Juiced Ball" Controversy By Tom Prendergast

Day two of the 28+ MSBL World Series ended much the same way that day one finished up, with a lot of teams scoring a bunch of runs. Six different teams scored at least 20 runs or more while 25 others scored in double digits. And in most cases, the games haven't been that one sided. The average score in most of those games is around 15 - 12. While several major leaguers have suggested a harder, tighter wound baseball, Rawlings executives continue to deny any difference in the baseballs from past seasons.

Surprisingly enough, talk around the breakfast tables, hotel pools, and hot tubs have our players wondering along those same lines. From reliable sources within the MSBL national organization, word has leaked that the "Steve Sigler" autographed signature on every WS baseball being used this year is different from previous years. Once again Rawlings officials through Anaconda (The Sports Store)-the official supplier of baseballs for the MSBL-have denied any noticeable difference in baseballs. One unidentified player asked, "if the baseballs aren't juiced, why are the teams scoring runs by the dozens?"

Diary of an Aging Baseball Player

Phoenix Forecast—Sunny and 80 (Part III) *Skies Partly Cloudy with Baseballs*

Those four years I spent at Knox College playing baseball in March and April turned out to be just the opening act. After graduation, I took my first job in a suburb of Minneapolis teaching junior high English. It was there where I learned the *true* meaning of cold. The fall began in a rather inauspicious way. But sometime in late September fall began to give way to winter. At Brooklyn Park Junior High, the faculty members were very proud of the last collect bargaining agreement they had negotiated. They convinced the administration to install electric plug-ins in the faculty parking lot, so we would have a place to plug in the engine heater.

We would no longer need a car pool. No, not the kind where you shared a ride to the school, but the kind where you took turns going to the parking lot at lunchtime and started all the cars. Before the electric plug-ins that noontime pick-me-up would usually insure the old sled would start at 3 p.m.

And I needed for it to start at 3 p.m. to get to my other job, volunteer assistant baseball coach at the University of Minnesota. I soon learned the big differences between the Big 10 Conference and the Midwest College Athletic Conference. Batting nets. Pitching machines. No fungos off the hardwood—fungos off a dirt floor in a building they called the fieldhouse.

January and February flew by as we prepared the Gophers for the start of the season. The team went to Florida for a week in early March to prepare for the conference. I stayed behind to make sure my 7th graders would know the difference between an infinitive and a gerund. We were equally unsuccessful. The team went something like 1-7 and my students still couldn't tell a noun from a verb. So Minnesota coach Dick Siebert did what any determined mentor would do. He worked the team harder. And to do that—you guessed it—he took the team outside.

The fur-lined, leather driving gloves wouldn't have made a difference here. No, it wasn't January cold, like the time we experienced eight straight days and the temperature never rose above 8-below. It was only March cold, which reminded me of January cold in Illinois.

"How can you put up with this?" I once asked a fellow teacher.

"It feels so good when spring comes," she replied.

Call me crazy but I never thought I should start hitting myself in the head with a hammer just so it would feel good when I stopped.

I don't recall Coach Siebert having a 32-degree rule. We went outside when he said so, which was everyday after the spring trip. But clearly the Gophers gained an advantage when one of those "southern" schools such as Purdue came to town.

That was most evident on May 11. I had heard snow in the forecast on the 10 o'clock news, but being my first year in the Twin Cities, I didn't believe it. When I reported to the locker room at nine the next morning, Coach Siebert handed me snow shovel. I joined the other assistants and several members of the grounds crew to begin removing The six inches of snow that had fallen overnight.

The temperature rose to 40 degrees by early afternoon so melting actually contributed to the snow removal. The game started only three hours late. The incredulous Boiler-makers, who probably closed down every bar in Dinkytown the night before, never had a chance. Minnesota swept them three straight.

But one year in Minnesota was enough for me. Tomorrow I will tell you about my experiences in the "south."

A Day In The Life of the MSBL World Series Headquarters

It's 7 am, and Steve Rosenburg arrives at the World Series Headquarters, propping open the door with a door stop, forgetting again to unlock it, as he has every morning since the day before this tournament started.

Steve is the assistant tournament director of the MABL / MSBL World Series, and he's the first one here in the morning. The games haven't yet started, but there's still much to do. Being an assistant tournament director is a tough position to define, but here goes: Steve takes care of anything tournament director Tom Prendergast doesn't. At this point of the morning, Tom isn't yet here (only because he just left a few hours ago), so Rosenburg is in charge.

It's not long, about 8, before Lou Myers arrives. Lou is the tournament's Umpire-in-Chief. With somewhere between 60 and 120 games going on each day at the tournament, each one needing at least two umpires, Myers' day is not leisurely, having to deal not only with scheduling, but also with any incidents that might arise. He is also in charge of making Tom's daily lunch salads, a Myers' specialty.

It would be tough to nail down a specific time at which Tom Prendergast arrives. In spirit, he never leaves (trust me, you wouldn't want his cell phone bill). Most evenings, he's here until well past midnight (last night, Tom left the office en route to Kinko's at about 1:30 am). This morning, he got here about 9.

Right about that time, the games begin.

The day is busy with the calls of scores and making sure that everything is organized to run smoothly. The hours are long, but rewarding to see the end result of keeping the passion for baseball alive on and off the field. Extra effort is made to make sure that everything is perfect.

Over the next couple of hours, the rest of the gang arrives. Randy Evans gets to work on his spreadsheets of the day's games and helps take score reports as they come in. This year, Randy (and the rest of us scoretakers) have the added responsibility of updating the website at Scorebook.com.

Clyde Miller also works the phones all day, taking calls from umpires and team managers, who call in to report scores and comment about the day's events. Miller's also hard at work keeping the "big boards" up-to-date, where the office workers can get a clear look at the schedule and results of the day.

Annie Sullivan, whom Tom describes as "the absolute best", has the job of *getting things done*. Every day her responsibilities range from registration to making sure protest calls don't ruin the office moral. She also helps with proofreading newsletter stories (liket tthiss one).

I assist Tom, but not in the same way Steve Rosenburg does. I'm mainly here to take some of the load off of Tom in getting WS information out to you, whether it be through the newsletter or at the main level information office, where the computer scrolls the scores.

Now that it's lunch time, Lou gets busy with his second job: making sure that Tom gets his salad with ranch for lunch. Tom's wife should thank Lou for keeping him healthy for us each tournament. (although we won't mention how many times he eats at the infamous Chuckbox each week).

Meanwhile, several protests have been called in and voiced to Tom. For the better part of the last hour while writing this article, I've been listening to Tom argue with two managers and an umpire over a play that, had one of the managers said something when it first happened, could have been avoided entirely.

MSBL president Steve Sigler (the boss) just dropped by the office. Luckily, today, we can be a little less tense while he's here, as yesterday's newsletter was mistake-free.

Now, Clyde hovers by, singing a medley from *The Lion King* while checking the boards. I've been tolerating it for about 20 minutes so far.

Steve Rosenburg leaves for dinner about 6 p.m. He plans to arrive back dark and early tomorrow.

Clyde and Randy yell 20 scores left. The countdown helps them see that the end of the day is coming.

There's a lull in the action here at HQ, as games are currently being played (as opposed to being reported here). I take the opportunity to update the PowerPoint program that rolls the scores downstairs so passersby can keep up-to-date on pool play.

Annie has left for dinner. Randy went to go stretch his legs. Both will be returning soon enough for the stretch run. Tom and I will be off ourselves in the near future, with most of my work still ahead of me.

The last game tonight starts at around 9, meaning we won't get the last score until past midnight. By one or one-thirty, Tom and I are putting this newsletter to bed.

I came here expecting long days and a busy office. Tom had warned me that the "8 am to past midnight" day was commonplace for us in the WS HQ office. What I was pleasantly surprised to find was the camaraderie and friendship that developed as the melting pot of disparate personalities in the office worked toward a common goal, transforming into a well-oiled team, and having fun doing it.
