When this schedule has allowed Jerry has also covered a few World Series games for us, mainly (but not only) in the early days from 1990 through 1992.

We've run a handful of photos from other contributors: however, if you've seen a picture in HardBall of yourself or your team at any World Series since 1992 or any Fall Classic since 1998, Chris, C.J. or Jerry almost certainly took it. The 2003 MSBL/MABL World Series Sets New Record With 353 Teams! By Tom Prendergast

Week two of the 2003 MSBL WS opened yesterday with 71 new teams, in three separate divisions. The 28+ Federal and Central along with the 38+ National started playing games on Monday. Last week 28 National, American and Continental teams participated in week one. Midway through last week 57 MABL teams played in the 18+ World Series. In all 353 teams will participate in this years MSBL/MABL World Series, making it once again the largest amateur baseball tournament ever held, (that's up from 329 last year). Part of the increase this year is due to three new divisions, 38+ & 48+ wood and 65+.

The good news for the players here this week is that the forecast calls for no rain unfortunately they'll be playing with temperatures in the 100's! This Thursday, the annual MSBL Trade Show will open at Tempe Diablo Stadium and that night the MSBL will host a western style cookout on the concourse. Everyone is welcome.

Diary of an Aging Baseball Player

My Hometown

It was the summer of 1957 in Maquon, Illinois, population 400.

Main Street in Maquon consisted of Strode's Garage, Parli Implement Company, The Farm Services Gas Station, Gooding's Grocery Store, Ferguson's TV Repair and Restaurant (go figure), and three taverns.

You could tell Maquon had its priorities straight.

But Maquon also had a post office, a library, an American Legion Hall, and oh, yes—a ballpark. Most every town in central Illinois had a ballpark. And on most summer days the town ballpark was the center of activity.

My buddies and I didn't have video games, DVD's, or cell phones. But we did have gloves, bats and baseballs. And we used them. Constantly. No one in the town ever had to mow the grass at the ballpark. We beat it down.

I actually grew up in the suburbs of Maquon (i.e. a farm) but often cajoled my Grandpa into hauling me the three miles into town for week-long visits. Grandma and Grandpa thought I just wanted to watch their new TV. What I really wanted to do was play baseball.

I do not think we ever set a formal meeting time, but everyday all of the young Maquon boys and an occasional girl would gather at the ballpark at 10 a.m. We would play till noon, go home and eat dinner (a Maquon word for the noon meal), then come back at 1 and play until supper (a Maquon word for the evening meal). Then we would go play on our Little League teams in the evening. If no Little Leagues were scheduled, we would come back to the ballpark and play until dark.

I mention all of this because of two key points. 1) We played baseball all of the time, so we got to be pretty good. 2) No adults were present to coach, cheer or mess up our games.

Neither of those two things seem to exist anymore.

Drive by the ballpark in Maquon or another town and I doubt you will see kids playing baseball. The ballparks still sit there. But the grass grows tall and the fields stand empty. Some evenings kids dads may arrive with their heavy metal (pickups, bats and kegs) for 40 minutes of softball and four hours of beer-guzzling. When was the last time you drove by a park on Wednesday afternoon in the summer and saw a dozen boys playing baseball?

Today the kids in Santuce play baseball, barefooted on rock-littered diamonds. The kids in Maquon play Halo or Sole Caliber2 on an X-Box. That should explain why Major League Baseball today features a majority of its players from Latin America.

It would be easy to blame the kids of today for this state of affairs, but a look back at Maquon in 1957 might offer some additional insight.

Earlier I mentioned "no adults present." As a result, we did not have teams, uniforms, standings, batting gloves, majors and minors, age groups, coolers full of Gatorade, First Aid Kits, sunscreen, playoffs, tournaments or trophies. Instead--we had fun.

We also had rules—our rules. We would make them up each session depending on who showed up and how many showed up.

For example, on shorthanded days we would play "right field out" or "pitcher's hands out." We might also prohibit bunting. We might have the team at bat provide a catcher or first baseman. If we were really short-handed we might take batting practice or play other games such as "500" or "Work-up." I doubt if my son has ever even heard of those games.

If every kid in town showed up, we could field two, nine-man teams. But the players would range in age from 6-13 and one was a girl. So that presented a different problem—Earl and Mouse.

Earl Ferry and Alvin "Mouse" Morse were both 12 years old. More significantly, Earl and Mouse were pitchers. They threw hard. And they *(continued on page 4)*

threw curve balls.

So we came up with a basic set of rules. Earl and Mouse had to be on different teams. When the little kids came up to bat (the 6-9 year olds) Earl and Mouse had to lob the ball in. Unfortunately I was 10 at the time. I had lobbied for rules that would occasionally allow me to get a base hit. But because Earl and Mouse were the oldest (and the meanest), their concessions only went so far.

By the next summer Earl and Mouse were working part-time jobs, so Earl's brother Frank, Jimmy Melton, Bobby Pruett and I became the self-appointed "Leaders of the Park." We still lobbed it to the 6-9 year old. But because none of the aforementioned could throw as hard as our predecessors, my batting average soared. I would usually go about 20 for 50 (per day). We would all have 500 at bats before the 4th of July. We helped each other. We improved. Eight hours of baseball per day will do that for you.

Compare that with the typical 10-year old today. Six practices in May. Six rained out practices in May. Twenty games in 30 days in June. Six games rained out in June. July 1—season over. We have to pick that all-star team to start traveling around and playing in tournaments. The net result is 15 kids from the league keep playing and 150 others start looking for something else to do. Here it is July, the best baseball month of the year, and 90 percent of the kids have packed away their gloves for the season. And you wonder how X-Box came to be so popular?

Back in Maquon "we didn't need no stinking all-star team." We just wanted to "play" ball. I am truly sorry my son never had the chance to experience Maquon. He never found out how much fun baseball could be.
